CSDS 216: Seminar in Voice Disorders Spring 2020

Introduction and Course Description

CSDS 216 is a 3 unit graduate seminar covering the assessment and treatment of voice disorders. The purpose of CSD 216 is to provide students with the opportunity for advanced study in the area of voice disorders. This course will include a comprehensive examination of current methodologies for the diagnosis and treatment of childhood and adult vocal pathologies. It will also include a comprehensive review of the anatomy, physiology and neurology associated with voice production.

Course Goals and Objectives

Following successful completion of this course students will demonstrate:

- Understanding of the anatomy, physiology, and neurology of phonation. (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standard 1)
- 2. Knowledge of the physical bases and processes involved in the production of voice. (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standard 1)
- 3. An understanding of the risk factors and etiologies associated with voice disorders, and how to prevent them, through written descriptions, the development of appropriate case history questions, the development of a "vocal hygiene program", and written examinations requiring them to do so.
- 4. The ability to identify specific voice disorders given the acoustic properties of the voice and physical characteristics of the vocal folds through participation in class discussions, written examinations requiring them to do so, and completion of a lab assignment requiring them to participate in laryngoscopic exams of the vocal folds and voice analysis using the CSL. (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standard 3)
- 5. An understanding of the components of a thorough voice assessment including the gathering of Case History information; clinical tasks used to assess loudness, pitch, quality and resonance; the use of instrumentation such as the CSL; and laryngoscopy, through class participation and the successful completion of Lab Assignments requiring them to do so.
- The ability to accurately identify appropriate interventions given a specific voice disorder, including voice disorders associated with gender identity and expression, through written exams and/or class presentations for assigned "facilitating techniques". (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standard 5)
- 7. An understanding of recent literature and evidence-based practice regarding the assessment and treatment of voice disorders through successful completion of a literature review, annotated bibliography, and/or well-supported research paper on an assigned voice topic. (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standards 3 & 5)

Examinations and Major Assignments

Your grade will be based on 3 examinations, a paper (annotated bibliography) and lab assignments. The tentative breakdown for points in the class is listed below, although this is subject to change, as needed. This will be finalized as the class goes forward. Class participation will also be considered at the time grades are assigned.

GRADING CRITERIA

The total number of points earned on the three tests, lab and paper will be summed. The final grade will be assigned according to the following criteria:

EXAMS

Exams will consist of objective questions, short answers, and essays. Questions may come from the reading assignments and/or information presented during the class lectures. All tests must be taken at the assigned time. Make up tests will only be given in cases of extreme emergency with a documented legal or medical excuse.

Exam 1 will cover the anatomy, physiology and neurology of the laryngeal mechanism. Students will be required to label structures of the larynx, to include the framework, and musculature; describe neural innervation of the larynx; describe the myoelastic-aerodynamic theory of voice production; and describe the process of vocal fold movements for abduction, adduction, pitch adjustments, and loudness adjustments.

Exam 2 will cover Etiologic Correlates, Pathologies of the Laryngeal Mechanism, and Voice Disorders. Students will: a) provide a written description of the etiologies associated with specific voice disorders; b) identify risk factors associated with specific voice disorders, and c) identify specific voice disorders given the acoustic properties of the voice and physical characteristics of the vocal folds seen on video.

Exam 3 will cover the Assessment and Treatment of Voice Disorders. Students will be required to list and describe the components of a comprehensive voice assessment, describe specific assessment procedures, list and describe various treatment procedures, and identify appropriate interventions given a specific voice disorder.

ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY / RESEARCH PAPER (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standard 3)

You will complete an annotated bibliography on a specific voice topic that you select. The annotated bibliography will contain 6 references. The references you select should be research-

based articles from peer reviewed journals. Look for articles that explore areas related to the treatment of voice disorders or of a specific voice disorder/pathology. The content of an annotated bibliography will be reviewed in class. Assignments need to be neatly typed, using APA (7th ed.) format. Annotated bibliographies are due on **April 13th**– no late assignments will be accepted.

SPEECH SCIENCE/VOICE LAB ASSIGNMENTS = (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standard 3)

Students will be required to complete a series of supervised lab assignments in the Speech Science/Voice Lab (PHS 217). The Lab Assignments will require you to successfully place a rigid endoscope 2 times, view a minimum of 5 voice disorder videos, and complete 4 lessons that require you to use the Computerized Speech Lab (CSL) to analyze voice.

Lab assignments/schedules will be distributed at the beginning of the semester. Lab Assignments will be due on **April 27th**.

IN-CLASS ASSIGNMENTS (CTC Speech-Language Pathology Services Credential Standard 3)

In addition to the major assignments, listed above, there will be a series of ungraded in-class assignments designed to provide practice in labelling laryngeal anatomy using pictures, models, and/or videos of endoscopic examinations; and to provide practice in identifying laryngeal pathologies when shown a photo or video. The instructor will point to a structure on a photo, video, or model, and you will be required to write down the name of the structure or of the pathology represented. You will be required to complete the same tasks during Exam 1 and Exam 2, as appropriate.

You will also be asked to provide a written description of the myoelastic aerodynamic theory of voice production. We will review these together in class so that you can refine your description, then use it to answer questions about voice production. This topic will also be covered on Exam 1.

Additional Requirements and Expectations

In accordance with procedures of CSUF, withdrawing from one or more classes after the second week of instruction can only be done for serious and compelling reasons. A serious and compelling reason typically includes a medical, emotional or other highly extenuating circumstance that precludes completion of the class.

It is usually expected that students will spend approximately 2 hours of study time outside of class for every one hour in class. Since this is a $\underline{3}$ -unit class, you should expect to study an average of $\underline{4}$ hours outside of class each week. Some students may need more outside study time and some less.

Attendance Policy

Regular attendance is mandatory. It is important to realize that missing one class is equivalent to missing an entire week's worth of classes. As graduate students, you understand that this is not acceptable. Poor attendance or tardiness may result in a deduction of up to 50 points from your

class total. This course covers complex subject matter that may not be explained clearly in the reading materials alone. Having said this, it is understood that serious and compelling situations do arise whereby an absence may become necessary. Following such an excused absence, it is the student's responsibility to obtain the class information from another student.
